



A character is someone who is in a story. It can be a person, an animal—even a robot!

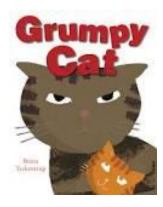
Describe your favorite character from the story. What do you like most about them? Talk about it with a grownup.

### Let's Play Follow the Leader

#### **Primary Objectives**

1b. Follows limits and expectations

Demonstrates traveling skills

#### Why It's Important

When you provide examples and model expected behavior, you help your child understand how and when to care for household materials. Although your child may be physically capable of completing specific tasks at home, he continues to learn by example. Demonstrating a task to your child and then asking him to immediately practice that task reinforces your home routines and expectations.

#### Materials

A room that needs tidying

#### What You Do

- Be sure there are several things out in the room that need to be put away. Include a variety
  of objects to be put in different locations around the room.
- Invite your child to play Follow the Leader. Ask him to follow you around the room and do what you do.
- Walk or march in a silly way to make cleaning up more enjoyable. Walk slowly around the room, picking up a toy and putting it away, then waiting for him to repeat your movements.
- Explain each task as you complete it. Now I am hanging a coat on the hook. Now you are hanging a coat on the hook.
- When the room is clean, remember to thank your child for his help with the task. Recall with your child all the areas that were messy and list together the items he put away.
- Point out to him how nice the room looks when it is clean and how easy it will be to find toys and materials later when he wants to use them.
- You can extend this activity by giving your child an opportunity to be the leader. Mimic his motions as he moves around the room putting things away.

### You Got It!

#### **Primary Objectives**

1c. Takes care of own needs appropriately

#### Why It's Important

As children learn what behavior is expected of them, it helps if they have reminders of those expectations. Personalized books with photos of your child demonstrating what to do during different times of the day provides her with individualized prompts.

#### Materials

Colored construction paper; photographs of your child (photos with friends or relatives, pictures from a family trip or special event, etc.); markers; tape; fasteners such as stapler, brads, rings

#### What You Do

- Determine which routines or experiences you want your child to focus on. Select ones that she performs regularly, particularly those with multiple steps. Take pictures of your child engaged in each step of the selected routines and experiences.
- Tape a single picture to each piece of construction paper. Arrange the pages in sequential order and bind them together.
- Explain to your child what you are making a book about (playing with blocks, getting ready for nap, etc.).
- Flip through the pictures with your child. Ask her to tell you what she is doing in each picture.
- Record her thoughts in a sentence underneath each photograph. For example, if your child says, washing hands, you might write, I wash my hands.
- When finished, read the book with your child. Tell her that the book will be available for her to look at whenever she would like.
